HOMECRAFT RULES AND REGULATIONS

1. All exhibitors must abide by the rules of the Ancaster Agricultural Society.
2. Exhibitors must purchase an exhibitor card. Adult - \$10.00, Junior Classes 117&118 (ages 9 to 21) - \$5.00. The exhibitor may enter as many articles as they wish, but only 1 article per section. If a Junior wishes to enter in Adult and Junior classes, only an adult exhibitor card is required.
3. **Entry Forms should be received by 4:30pm Friday, Sept. 7th**, but will be accepted until Wednesday, Sept. 19th. Exhibitors are asked to complete the enclosed entry form or enter online. A computer-generated entry tag will be supplied for each article, which must be attached to the article to serve as a means of identification.
4. ENTRY TAGS for entry forms received on or before August 31st, 2018 will be mailed back if requested. All other entry tags can be picked up at the office.
5. Entry forms received by August 24th will be entered into a draw for three - \$25.00 prizes!
6. Exhibits must be placed in Marritt Hall between 2:00 p.m. and 9:00 p.m. on Wed. Sept. 19th only. **No entries will be taken on Thursday.** Judging will begin on Thursday morning. Marritt Hall closes at 6:00 p.m. on Sun., Sept. 23rd. Exhibits must remain in the Hall until 7:00 p.m. Between 7:00 p.m. and 8:00 p.m. exhibits must be removed by claim ticket only.
7. Be it distinctly understood that in no case shall the Ancaster Agricultural Society, its Directors, Officers or Employees be held responsible for loss of, or damage to, any article or articles while being exhibited at the Ancaster Fair. Notwithstanding, reasonable care will be maintained at all times.
8. In case there is an error in the printing of this Prize List, the Directors of the A. A. S. have the power to correct any errors.
9. Entries must be the exhibitor's work, and not shown prior to 2017.
10. Judges may disqualify soiled and/or old exhibits.
11. Judges shall have discretionary powers to withhold any prize where they deem an article unworthy.
12. Anyone who interferes with the judge while carrying out his/her duties shall forfeit the right to a prize, or could be asked to leave the property.
13. An exhibitor lodging a protest regarding an exhibit must make it in writing to the Secretary Treasurer, accompanied by a \$10.00 deposit as soon as the problem is apparent. In no case shall a protest be lodged more than 24 hours after the Fair. The protest will be decided by the Committee under direction of the Chairman. In case of Committee disagreement or in case of appeal, the Ancaster Agricultural Society President will make the final decision. Prize money may be forfeited. If the protest is not sustained, the \$10.00 deposit will be forfeited.
14. Awards for Most Points may be won by the same exhibitor for two (2) consecutive years. Following the third year, the exhibitor may again be eligible to win the Most Points Award.
Points calculated: 1st - 10 points; 2nd - 9 points; etc. to 5th.
15. All exhibitors winning \$20.00 or more will have \$10.00 retained for their 2019 exhibitor card.
16. All entry fees will be used for prize money. A 10% entry fee will be deducted from all prize money won, except in the Junior classes. All prizes will be paid by cheque as soon as the clerical work is completed.
17. Prize money cheques must be cashed before November 30, 2018.

4. Cover cakes and pies with saran wrap.
5. Place all other items in appropriately sized ziplock bags.
6. Place smaller items, ie. muffins, cookies, etc. on appropriately sized paper plate inside a ziploc bag.
7. "Named"- print name of item on exhibitors'tag
8. Entries submitted on glass or ceramics at your own risk.
9. Winners must agree to use of name/picture for publicity without payment.
10. Baking exhibits left until Monday, will be disposed of.
11. **All recipes and product labels to be retained**

BREAD

Bread - One loaf

RECIPE:

- 1 package (1/4 ounce) active dry yeast
- 1/4 cup warm water (110° to 115°)
- 3/4 cup warm whole milk (110° to 115°)
- 1 large egg
- 1/4 cup butter, softened
- 1/4 cup granulated sugar
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 3-1/4 to 3-3/4 cups all-purpose flour
- 3/4 cup jam of preference
- 2 tablespoons butter, melted
- Confectioners' sugar

- a) Dissolve yeast in warm water until foamy. In another bowl, combine milk, egg, butter, sugar and salt; add yeast mixture and 3 cups flour. Beat on medium speed until smooth, about 1 minute. Stir in enough remaining flour to form a soft dough.
- b) Turn onto a floured surface; knead until smooth and elastic, 6-8 minutes. Place in a greased bowl, turning once to grease top. Cover with plastic wrap; let rise in a warm place until doubled, about 1 hour.
- c) Punch down dough. Turn onto a lightly floured surface; divide into four portions. Roll one portion into a 12-in. circle. Place on a greased 14-in. pizza pan. Spread with one-third of the jam to within 1/2 in. from edge. Repeat twice, layering dough and jam, and ending with final portion of dough. Place a 2-1/2-in. round cutter on top of the dough in center of circle (do not press down). With a sharp knife, make 16 evenly spaced cuts from round cutter to edge of dough, forming a starburst. Remove cutter; grasp two strips and rotate twice outward. Pinch ends together. Repeat with remaining strips.
- d) Cover with plastic wrap; let rise until almost doubled, about 30 minutes. Preheat oven to 375°. Bake until golden brown, 18-22 minutes. (Watch during final 5 minutes for any dripping.) Remove from oven; brush with melted butter, avoiding areas where jam is visible. Cool completely on a wire rack. Dust with confectioners' sugar.

Raspberry Apple Jam

3 C (750ml) crushed raspberries, about 3 pints

1 Lemon, rind & juice

2C (500ml) unsweetened applesauce

7 C Granulated Sugar

1 (57g) pkg Bernardin Original Fruit Pectin

- Wash, thoroughly drain and crush raspberries, one layer at a time.
- Grate rind from lemon and squeeze juice to measure 1/4 cup (50 ml). Measure sugar; set aside.
- In a large deep stainless steel saucepan, combine prepared raspberries, applesauce, lemon juice, 1/2 tsp (2 ml) butter or margarine to reduce foaming, and BERNARDIN® Original Pectin. Over high heat, bring mixture to a full rolling boil. Add all of the sugar. Stirring constantly, return mixture to full rolling boil. Boil hard 1 minute, stirring constantly. Remove from heat; skim off foam, if necessary.

Rules and Regulations

1. There will be a registered judge.
2. All wines to be judged must be made by amateur winemakers.
3. All exhibitors must pay an exhibitor fee of \$10.00 to the Ancaster Agricultural Society.
4. All exhibitors must comply with all L.L.B.O. requirements. No wines will be displayed, none will be returned.
5. All wines to be judged become the property of the Ancaster Agricultural Society.
6. Each entry must have the tag supplied by the Ancaster Fair securely tied to each container with a list of basic ingredients (eg type of fruits, percentages and process-kit or not). No other identification mark is allowed on the bottle (ie no label etc).
7. No single wine may be entered into more than one section.
8. Exhibitors are responsible to ensure their exhibits are in the correct section. An entry not in it's appropriate section will be disqualified.
9. Containers must be standard green, clear, or amber wine bottles and may be of either cork or screw-cap finish. Volume must not exceed 750 ml, there shall be no distinguishing marks or labels. Non-standard wine bottles will not be accepted.
10. Judging will be based upon the following criteria, Colour, Clarity, Bouquet and Flavour, Balance and Quality (and Sparkle where appropriate) based on the Wine Judges of Canada criteria.
11. All wine entry forms are to be submitted to the Ancaster Fair Office by **Wednesday, September 5, 2018**.
12. Entries will be accepted at the Ancaster Fair Office from **Tuesday, September 4 until Wednesday, September 5, 2018 during regular office hours of 8:30AM to 4:30PM**.
13. Judging will be open format and take place at Marritt Hall on **Friday, September 7, 2018 at 7:00PM –Sharp- Doors open at 6:30PM. Each exhibitor of sections 2 to 11 may bring one guest.**
14. **Attendance at the judging is by invitation only.**
15. Judges decision is final.

4. **Country**-Must be made at least 95% from non-grape ingredients. Oxidized and herbed wines are not acceptable. A wide latitude of colour is permissible but colour must be attractive. Sweetness may range from dry to sweet. Alcohol must be in balance with the character of the wine.
5. **Mead**-A wine made from honey. Can be flavoured with fruits, flowers, herbs or spices. There are two main ways to make Mead, one is balanced as a table wine to be consumed with food and the other is a social wine to be consumed on social occasions rather than an accompaniment of food. Either is acceptable for judging-please specify.
6. **Sparkling**-Produces small bubbles that rise continuously throughout the duration. Any colour is acceptable providing it is attractive. Clarity is imperative. Dry to sweet wines are acceptable. Light to medium bodied with 8% to 12% alcohol.
7. **Social**-Non-sparkling wines of any colour, body or alcoholic content. Any sweetness is acceptable.
8. **Rosé**-Pale pinks, oranges, purples and light reds are acceptable. Rosé wines are light to medium-bodied and have an alcohol content of 9% to 12%.
9. **Dessert Wine**-Alcohol is 13% to 15%. Alcohol is derived from fermentation. Any attractive colour is acceptable. The bouquet is fruity and full. Medium to full-bodied. Sweet and in character with dessert.
